TARRANT COUNTY TRANSPORTATION SERVICE

Countywide transportation is available every Wednesday for residents of Westworth Village who are disabled or 65 years of age and older. A one way fare costs \$2.50 with service hours from 6am to 6pm. Citizens must register and make reservations 7 to 10 days in advance by calling the American Red Cross at 817-336-8714, between 8:30am and 4:30pm, Monday through Friday. These services are not available on weekends or holidays.

FIRE HAZARDS & FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

Ensuring public safety is one of the most important goals of municipal government. As we decorate our homes for the holiday season, staff would like to remind our residents of proper fire prevention. Holiday decorations should be non-flammable or flame-retardant and be placed safely away from all heat sources. Do not block exits. Ensure electric wires are not frayed, cracked, or otherwise damaged. Don't string more lights than package directions allow. Use caution with extension cords and make certain wall outlets are working properly. Use appropriately sized candle holders and never leave them unattended. If a fire breaks out, your first priority is to save life. Get everyone out of the home and call 911. DO NOT put yourself and your family in harm's way. Let the professionals do their jobs. Having a suitable extinguisher on hand is always a good idea. Extinguishers should be placed in the kitchen, between the bedrooms, office, garage, and workshop.

Choose the correct RATING for the job: Class A) ordinary combustible materials, such as paper and plastic; Class B) for combustible liquids, such as gasoline, kerosene, and grease; Class C) electronics; Class K) for cooking oils and fat-based products.

The two most common types of extinguishers are water and dry chemical (foam or powder). NEVER use a water extinguisher on grease fires. Remember, it may not be glamorous, but a fire extinguisher is an excellent gift for those you love! For more information, see the following websites:

GREASE IS A HAZARD TO OUR HEALTH

Please Don't Feed the Storm Drain!

Residents should never dispose of cooking grease or cooking oils by washing them down the plumbing system or the storm drain. The oils pollute streams and creeks by forming a film on the water surface and prevent oxygenation for

aquatic life. Polluted water runoff can lead to severe fines from State and Federal regulatory agencies. As sewer pipes back up, sewage and food particles accumulate and create a health hazard by attracting insects and vermin. Soak leftover amounts of cooking oil with a paper towel and throw it in the trash; filter and freeze to reuse for another meal; or recycle cooking oil by calling the Fort Worth Household Hazardous Waste Collection Center at 817-871-5257.
