Message from the Water Utilities Services

Residential Winter Sewer Averaging

Each year the City of Westworth Village averages the water consumption of the December, January, and February billing periods to recalculate sewer charges. These months are used because typically residents do not have a high outdoor water demand and are considered to be the lowest overall water use.

The new winter sewer average goes into effect on the March billing and that will be the new monthly sewer charge for the next twelve months.

Commercial

Sewer charges for commercial customers are based on the monthly water consumption.

Water Conservation Tips

- Residents should begin preparations to monitor for any water leaks, monitor water consumption and practice beneficial water conservation.
- Most grasses and vegetation are now dormant; watering of grass, plants, and landscaping should be kept to a minimum.
- Sewer cost could go up, down, or stay about the same depending on how much water is used during December through February billing.



Grease is a Hazard to Our Health



Residents should never dispose of cooking grease or cooking oils by washing them down the plumbing system or the storm drain. Oils pollute our streams and creeks by forming a film on the water surface and preventing oxygenation for aquatic life. Polluted water runoff can lead to severe State and Federal fines. As sewer pipes back up, food and sewage particles accumulate to create a health hazard by attracting insects and vermin. Soak leftover amounts of cooking oil with a paper towel and throw it in the trash, filter and freeze to reuse for another meal, or recycle cooking oil by calling the Fort Worth Household Hazardous Waste Collection Center at 817-871-5257.




Sight Visibility Concerns at intersections

In an effort to address citizens concerns over alleyway safety issues, landscaping and parking, the Public Safety Committee requested I provide a general overview of the city ordinances regarding these issues.

Alleyway safety issues: Ordinance section #14.4.15 outlines the responsibility to maintain a visibility triangle on your property for the safety of motorists & pedestrians at intersections, alleyways and driveways. Specifically stating "Landscaping, except required grass and low ground cover, shall not be located closer than three feet (3') from the edge of any vehicular pavement in order to avoid visibility problems when plant materials mature." In addition, section #14.4.35 expounds upon the requirements including: "Landscaping, fences, walls, earthen berms and other features within the triangular visibility area shall be designed so as to provide unobstructed cross-visibility at a level between twenty-four inches (24") and eight feet (8') above the ground."

Examples of sight visibility triangles





Based upon the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials Standards (AASHTO) for a 30 MPH roadway, an approaching driver needs to have a minimum of sight visibility of 200 ft to the left and 140ft to the right to ensure adequate sight distance. This distance is based upon the speed of the roadway, reaction time and stopping distance.

Fences that did not meet the standards, that were in place prior to 2017, were allowed to remain: 14.4.25(O) "A fence that does not comply with the requirements of this Article as of the effective date of this Chapter, shall be allowed to remain on the property. In addition, the owner of property shall be allowed to repair or replace a pre-existing nonconforming fence with identical materials used in the construction…"

Landscaping and vegetation must be maintained, as outlined in Section 14.4.16: "It shall be the duty of any person or persons owning or occupying real property bordering on any street to prune trees next to the street in such manner that they will not obstruct or shade the streetlights, obstruct the passage of pedestrians on sidewalks, obstruct vision of traffic signs, or obstruct the view from any street or alley intersection. The minimum clearance of any portion of a tree overhanging public street right-of-way shall be fourteen feet (14') and overhanging a public sidewalk shall be eight feet (8').





Parking issues: The Police Department will be actively issuing citations to owners of unoccupied vehicles that are parked in violation of city ordinances or state law. Common violations include vehicles that stand or

park:



* Parked obstructing a sidewalk



* within 15ft of a fire hydrant



* within 20ft of an intersection crosswalk



* within 30 feet of any signal, stop sign or yield sign



* Parked against the flow of traffic or wrong direction

Staying safe means being responsible on our streets and roads. Please help us by doing your part to maintain landscaping, vegetation, sight visibility and parking. Remember it's your family and neighbors that you are protecting by providing a safe neighborhood!
